



## Additional Information and Resources in Napa County

The premier source of information on all kinds of recycling in Napa County is the Recycling Guide, located in the phone book yellow pages under “recycling”. It is also available online at [www.naparecycling.com/recycle-guide](http://www.naparecycling.com/recycle-guide). It includes information on used oil and other household hazardous wastes. Portions of the Guide are also provided in Spanish.

[www.calmax.org](http://www.calmax.org) is a materials exchange for businesses and individuals. In addition to listings of items available and needed, the “Local Recycling Info” link has a lot of useful information.

For questions involving used oil and filters in the City of Napa, call the contractor C2: Alternative Services (we are also the company that has produced the Family Car lesson.) Call Connie Cloak or Chris Carrieri, 568-3783. The County staff person in charge of the used oil recycling program is David Briggs, 253-4094. Napa County has 19 drop-off locations for used oil and filters located throughout the County. There is a complete list in the Recycling Guide, which is reproduced on the last page of the student lesson book. There is also information on the Napa-Vallejo Hazardous Waste Collection Facility which is open every Friday and Saturday from 9-4. For more information on the facility call 800-984-9661.

Most areas of the County also have curbside oil collection service available to customers who have residential trash service. The procedure is to call the hauler (Napa Recycling & Waste Services customers call 255-5200; Upper Valley Disposal customers call 963-7988; American Canyon customers call 552-3110) and request an oil recycling container and a zip-lock filter bag. These are placed on the curb for pick-up on the customer’s regular trash day. The customer must call the hauler by noon the day before the pickup so the driver knows to look for the oil and filter. (This information is also on the last page of the student lesson book.)

Residents of multifamily housing that have bins instead of individual trash & recycling carts do not have curbside service for used oil and filters at this time.
