Solano County has more than 40 drop-off locations for used oil and filters, located throughout the County. There is a complete list on the last page of the student lesson book.

Most areas of the County also have curbside collection service available to customers who have individual trash service. (Exceptions include Dixon, Rio Vista and Travis Air Force Base which have no curbside programs, and Benicia, where oil but not filters are picked up.) Details vary with each location, and are described on page 19 of the Guide. Place the tightly sealed jug and bag next to (not in) the recycling bin for pick-up on the regular trash day.

Residents of multifamily housing that have dumpsters instead of individual carts do not have curbside service.

The Recycling Guide has a comprehensive list of locations where Household Hazardous Waste may be taken. Some of these are listed as BOPAs (meaning they accept only batteries, oil, paint, and antifreeze) and others as accepting Universal Waste (which include fluorescent bulbs, mercury switches, & electronic waste). The three locations that take all types of household hazardous wastes (aside from certain materials like explosives, radioactive waste, and narcotics) are also listed on the last page of the student lesson book.
